
Services Provided in 2015-2016

- Adoption Respite Care: In-home respite care for adoptive families. 201 children were served in 258 visits totaling over 1,477 hours of care.
- Counseling Services: Professional therapy for children, families, and individuals. 717 clients received over 5,417 hours of therapy. 279 individuals attended educational classes taught by clinical staff for a combined total of 452 staff hours. 92 sessions of support groups ran for 184 hours.
- Crisis Nurseries: 24/7 free short-term childcare for families in crisis situations and children at-risk of abuse or neglect. 1,501 children made 10,076 visits to the crisis nursery, including 1,176 overnight stays, 10,884 meals, and over 56,006 hours of care.
- In-Home Parenting Programs: Free in-home parenting support. The Family Mentor Program served 234 individuals in 81 families during 339 visits and 508 hours of in-home support. The Peer Parenting Program served 939 individuals in 120 families through 1,043 hours of in-home support.
- KidStart Daycare: Low-cost, bilingual, curriculumbased daycare services for low-income working families. 82 children were served with 7,068 hours of care, enabling 75 parents to better access the workforce.
- LifeStart Village: Housing and self-sufficiency program for homeless single mothers and their children. 280 individuals were served across all three phases of the program. Over 910 hours of case management were provided.
